

To make a difference in the education, independence, and quality of life for blind and visually impaired students in Kentucky.



2017 Annual Report July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017

Grants

The Kentucky School for the Blind Charitable Foundation (KSBCF) provides grant funding to blind and visually impaired individuals and groups/organizations who serve students who are blind or visually impaired. Listed below are just a few of the grants the foundation funded in 2017:

- \$250,000 grant awarded to the Kentucky School for the Blind (KSB)
- \$55,500 to the Visually Impaired Preschool Services (VIPS) outreach program
- \$10,000 to Radio Eye
- Bill Roby Track & Field Games
- Prodigi Connect to a visually impaired student in Jessamine county
- A Therapeutic Listening System to a visually impaired student in Jefferson county



The Braille Writer Loan Program provides devices to those that are in need of one. In 2017, the charitable foundation lent twelve Braille writers to blind and visually impaired individuals in Kenton, Pulaski, Hardin and other counties across Kentucky. The charitable foundation and volunteers will also clean and repair Braille writers that are loaned through this program. In 2017, the charitable foundation spent over \$1,100 for Braille writer repair parts.

Scholarships

The charitable foundation offers financial support to blind and visually impaired students in Kentucky through its scholarship programs. The Will Evans Scholarship provides financial assistance for blind and visually impaired students who want to pursue post-secondary education.

The William Wood Foundation Scholarship provides financial assistance and laptops with assistive technology to blind and visually impaired post secondary-bound seniors who attended two years of the INSIGHT program. In 2017, the charitable foundation awarded six of these scholarships to students who are pursuing their college degrees at Campbellsville University, Eastern Kentucky University, Kent State University, Murray State University and the University of Louisville.

The Joseph Kuczwara Scholarship Award is given to a Kentucky School for the Blind graduate in recognition of their positive attitude, good citizenry, leadership and services to others. In 2017, this scholarship was awarded to a graduating senior who will be pursuing their college degree at Eastern Kentucky University.

The Dr. Franklin Jelsma "To See Through Love" Scholarships is given to two Kentucky School for the Blind graduates. One is award for outstanding achievements in academics and, the other, for outstanding achievements in community service, work ethic, and respect for others. In 2017, the charitable foundation awarded each recipient with a \$500 award.
